UPMC Educational and Research Autopsy	PROS: No refusal, minimal review for acceptability CONS: Charge for non-UPMC patients, Family pays for funeral Through the University of Pittsburgh Medical Center, Department of Pathology, patients or next-of-kin of deceased patients can pursue an educational and research autopsy. The autopsy is free-of-charge to UPMC patients but may cost up to \$3,000 for non-UPMC patients. With this pathway an autopsy will be performed, during which the process and results will benefit teaching of medical students and training of pathology residents. 	Pittsburgh School of Medicine, and will be banked at the Health Sciences Center Tissue Bank for use in future research projects. The cost of funeral arrangements, cremation or other burial processes will be paid for by the family. This pathway does NOT result in low-cost or free cremation at the hospital. All post-autopsy management of the deceased patient will be handled by a funeral home selected by the family. The funeral home will charge the family for after-death care, funeral, embalming and/or cremation.		
MedCure	PROS: No cost to family, free cremation, minimal review for acceptability & registration available before or at time of death. CONS: Criteria changes & Limited refusal based on certain health factors. Medcure serves as the bridge between a donor and the medical researchers and educators that rely on donors to help discover cures for diseases and develop new and effective treatments and therapies. They do this by acquiring, recovering, processing, storing and distributing organs and tissues to approved medical researchers and educators. Most people who want to donate can! There is no upper age limit and most disease processes are acceptable. The most common reasons for decline are a diagnosis of HIV/AIDS, hepatitis B or C, history of illegal drug use, incarceration or institutionalization and being severely over or under weight at the time of death. CONS: Limited refusal based on certain health factors including BMI & contagious diseases. Humanity Gifts Registry	PROS: No cost to family & cremation by HGR CONS: Patients need to register ahead of time, somewhat stringent review requirements. The Humanity Gifts Registry is a non-profit agency of the Commonwealth of Pennsylvania concerned primarily with the receipt and distribution of bodies donated to all medical and dental schools in the state for teaching purposes. The Registry, formerly called the Anatomical Board, has been in existence since 1883. This organization can work with patients before death or next-of-kin after death, to review donor information and determine acceptability. They have specific selection criteria so all patients may NOT qualify for this route of donation.
